# Happy 90th Birthday to Our Chapter!

The following historical information was provided May 20, 2019, by the Executive Assistant at the New York City national headquarters of the American Guild of Organists. The information was gleaned from the archives held at the headquarters.

The first AGO chapter in Texas was formed in 1918 and headquartered in Dallas. That first chapter was known as the *Texas Chapter*. On May 17, 1929, the *Fort Worth Branch*, headquartered in Fort Worth, was formed out of the Texas Chapter. Structurally, the Fort Worth Branch retained an affiliation with the Texas Chapter.

Because the AGO no longer uses the "branch" system of starting chapters, AGO headquarters counts the *charter date* of a chapter as the date when it was formed as a branch. This allows for a truthful record of the full length of time that a group of organists of the AGO have been organized in the chapter's namesake location where they associated. **Therefore, the official chartered date of the Fort Worth Chapter is listed as May 17, 1929**, as set in the records at AGO headquarters.

On December 6, 1932, the AGO National Council authorized the Fort Worth Branch to become an independent chapter to be known as the *Fort Worth Chapter*, thereby cutting affiliation with the Texas Chapter. On June 20, 1933, the Fort Worth Chapter ratified the election of its first officers of the chapter:

Dean:Miss F. Davies (later to become Mrs. E. Hodges)Sub-Dean:Mr. W. J. MarshSecretary:Nathalie JessupTreasurer:Mrs. H. O. Childress

Fort Worth Chapter's internal records show that a Miss Helen Ewing was managing the Fort Worth Branch in the 1930 – 1932 period as the branch was being reorganized into a new chapter. She has been shown as the first dean of the chapter, but technically, she was still part of the branch structure. Miss Davies, as listed above, is the very first dean of the newly organized chapter.

In 1962, the Texas Chapter was re-named the Dallas Chapter.

### **3rd Revision of Chapter Operating Procedures is Now Official**

The revision was approved by the Executive Committee at their meeting on January 12, 2019, ratified by a quorum of chapter members at the general chapter membership meeting and dinner at St. Alban's Anglican Church on February 18, 2019, accepted by Vicki Schaeffer, Councilor of the Southwest Region, on May 28, 2019, approved by Eileen Hunt, National Vice President, and archived at national headquarters by Erik Birk, Executive Assistant, on May 28, 2019.

The original procedures were ratified January 28, 2008. The 1st revision was November 9, 2012, and the 2<sup>nd</sup> revision was May 1, 2015. Main changes included in the 3<sup>rd</sup> revision are:

- 1) Structural changes:
  - Professional Development Committee. Added the Scholarship Administrator position.
  - Finance Committee. Added Deputy Treasurer position.
  - Communications Committee. Put all communications jobs in this committee.
    - - Abolished the Newsletter & Yearbook Committee and created Editor position
    - - Abolished Information & Technology Committee and created Webmaster position
    - - Created Chapter Photographer position
    - - Created Email Administrator position
    - - Created Community Arts Calendar Coordinator position
    - - Social Media Coordinator remains on the committee
  - Courtesy & Hospitality Committee. Renamed it Courtesy Committee and moved hospitality job to Program Committee for better coordination for events requiring beverages and food.
- 2) Procedural changes:
  - Accommodates non-profit legal requirements (IRS reporting requirements) and changes in the national AGO HQ operating procedures and mission statement, and prohibitions lodged against the AGO by the federal gov't.
  - Documented details on budget preparation that had been omitted.
  - Enlarged election process to include ballots/voting in person at general membership meetings, by postal mail or by email.
  - Documented that dues are no longer collected by the Treasurer but done by AGO HQ.
  - And other minor procedural details that were previously not documented to make the *Operating Procedures* to better reflect actual procedures.

He recently took a turn on stage as an actor portraying Cosme McMoon in One Thirty Productions' staging of the Florence Foster Jenkins story entitled *Glorious*! He has also performed on stage at Granbury Opera House and at Bass Hall as a member of the quartet in Casa Mañana's Music Man.

Hans lives with his wife and three children in Aledo. He looks forward to becoming an active part of the chapter – starting by preparing for the Service Playing Certification examination.

# **From AGO Headquarters**

This great news just out from AGO headquarters:

"The AGO was named the beneficiary of a bequest from Dr. Christian Herrmann Jr. in honor of Frederick Swann. **Totaling nearly \$15 million, the gift will be the largest received in the history of the Guild.** The Executive Director's column in the July issue of *The American Organist* will include full details."

This great news that will result in creating new national educational programs for organists and other membership features on the national level made me think about us golden oldie members, and the opportunity we have to include the Fort Worth Chapter in our wills. Will Hayes left assets of almost \$10,000 from his estate, and the assets were used to form a memorial scholarship for young organists. Other opportunities exist to fund educational workshops, Pipe Organ Encounters for young organists of the Southwestern AGO Region, establishing a permanent concert fund to feature rising stars, gifts to support the general operating expenses of the chapter, and if one has no heirs, the opportunity to bequeath a residence to the chapter that could be sold to provide funds to procure a permanent office and meeting space for chapter meetings.

### Self-Publish Your Compositions

It's always been a struggle for a composer to get a new work published, especially by traditional music publishing companies. The alternative has been for the composer to build a website store to sell compositions. Most upstart composers or performing musicians who every once in a while compose a score, don't have the time or interest to set up their own website store.

Take heart! Self-publishing stores are starting to open in the virtual world as websites that make it very easy to get your music published and sold! You just compose the work; the virtual store takes care of everything else! Basic features offer you a method to upload a PDF version of your score (that you have composed using notation software such as Finale or Sibelius). You state the selling price (or you may offer it to the market as a free publication). The website adds your score to their inventory and indexes it to key search words. (You hold the copyright to your work.) When a buyer pays to download your score, the website takes a commission on the selling price and pays you the balance. The website takes care of the everything. You just have to upload scores.

Your score can be totally original, based on a score in the public domain, or an arrangement of a copyrighted score. If the latter, the website will do the copyright permission work for you. The websites don't care if you just have one score to publish or if you intend to be regularly uploading new scores. The more your scores sell, the less the website takes in commission. Marketing is done by you through social media or your own client email initiatives, or you can pay the websites a modest price to market your scores. Here are two websites to check out:

In the future, expect to see more self-publishing opportunities, making traditional publishing houses less appealing.

#### A message from the certification coordinator – Peggy Graff

Summer greetings!

Several of you have indicated an interest in AGO certification. Whatever certification level you attempt, the process and the outcome is certainly worth it. Further development in the areas of hymn playing, organ repertoire, sight-reading, and other aspects of these exams are guaranteed; and you will also feel a sense of fulfillment and gratification in having done this for yourself.

Important information about exam certification will be included in the July, 2019 issue of *The American Organist*. It will give exam application deadlines, cost of the exams, organ repertoire lists from which to select for each exam, and other exam requirements. The five levels of certification in order of difficulty are:

Service Playing Certificate (SPC) Colleague (CAGO) Choir Master (ChM) Associateship (AAGO) Fellowship (FAGO)

The exam center for the FWAGO is First United Methodist Church – Fort Worth (800 West 5<sup>th</sup> Street – Fort Worth – 76248). Workshops for the SPC and CAGO certification exams will be held there later this summer. The SPC workshop is scheduled for Saturday, August 17 from 10-12 and the CAGO workshop is scheduled for Saturday, August 24 from 10-12 p.m.. There is no cost for the workshop; however, you must register for the workshop by August 1. Contact Peggy Graff at pgraff@myfumc.org.
