I hope you have people in each of your respective churches, as I do, who fully live into their role in the liturgy and give you cause week after week to leave Worship with a joyful heart!

On Saturday, he will offer an improvisation workshop at 10 am at First Presbyterian Church, at which all FWAGO members are invited and encouraged to attend.

These "Fall FWAGO" opportunities allow us to hear performances of world-class organists and also learn from them in masterclass/workshop settings. No matter how educated and experienced we are, we can certainly aspire to further develop as musicians and organists. AGO CERTIFICATION EXAM COORDINATOR'S REPORT BY PEGGY GRAFF, CAGO

Many of our FWAGO chapter members have been certified, due to the remarkable work of Ed Ackermann, who launched the certification project in 2006 along with Rick Grimes, Dean, and the executive committee. In April of 2008, the first Service Playing Certification (SPC) exam took place with 25 candidates. At this date, our chapter has 38 out of 142 certified members - 23% of our chapter! We are indeed thankful for the movers and shakers who prepared the way for the rest of us in this regard. The following is the breakdown of the number of members who have passed various certification levels from 2008 to the present:

Currently, 12 members are in the process of preparing to be certified in the 2019-2020 cycle. Summer workshops were presented to eight potential candidates for the Service Playing Certification (SPC) and Colleague (CAGO) exams. THE OPENING EVENT OF THE SEASON

A large audience was present. The program consisted of eight hymns, three anthems and readings. The third anthem, "Sing Praises to the Lord," composed by our member, **Janet Pummill**, had its world premiere at the event. Conducting the choirs were **Dr. Todd Prickett**, director at University Christian Church; Robert Stovall, director at First United Methodist Church; **Michael Waschevski**, director at First Presbyterian Church. Readers included our chapter members **Ahreum Han Congdon**, music director/organist of First Presbyterian Church; **Dan Garland**, who built the church's organ; **Peggy Graff**, our chapter's Program Committee Chair and Subdean; **Janet Pummill**, organist of the church; and **Dr. Amy Stewart**, assistant organist of the church. Dr. Welch's prelude was "Choral Fantasy on LOBE DEN HERREN," by Aaron David Miller. Dr. Welch concluded the program with "Toccata" from Widor's *Symphony for Organ No. 5*. The chapter and church cosponsored the event.

A CELEBRATION OF AUSTIN OPUS 809

The past Sunday after Easter, Central Presbyterian Church in Waxahachie celebrated 100 years of worship in the present building. The contract for the construction for a new organ was signed with Austin Organ Company on May 9, 1918, as construction proceeded on a new church building. The new building and new organ were first used on Easter Sunday, April 20, 1919. A concert celebrating 100 years of the Austin organ (3 manuals, 19 ranks) will be held on Sunday, October 6, 2019 at 3:00 p.m. Randy Arey, the present organist for over 18 years, will present the celebration concert that will include works by Bach, Buxtehude, Dupre, Schumann, Shearing, Wesley, and Vierne to display the diversity of sounds of the organ. Please plan to attend this special 100 year celebration of the Austin organ at Central Presbyterian Church, 402 N. College Street, Waxahachie, TX 75165. Be sure to invite friends and family to attend.

KATIE MINION SHEETZ



CONGRATULATIONS TO DAVID PRESTON, CAGO



Our chapter member and one of our rising stars, **David Preston, CAGO**, was runner up in the AGO Regional Competition for Young Organists (RCYO) held at Augustana Lutheran Church in Denver, part of the Southwest AGO Regional Convention. He received a prize of \$500 and recognition at the convention. He will also be highlighted in a fall issue of *The American Organist*.

In January, David presented a solo recital on the new Redman three manual tracker organ at Calvary Lutheran Church in Richland Hills. In March, he was a winner in the William C. Hall organist competition in San Antonio. Competing in the undergraduate division as a first-year college student, he won both the \$1,100 first prize and the \$250 prize for best hymn playing. Last year, David turned heads when he became one of the youngest organists to be awarded the CAGO (Colleague of the American Guild of Organists) certification by the national AGO certification committee.

This summer, David visited Groningen province in the Netherlands to attend *Groningen Orgelzomer*, a program highlighting the 300th anniversary of the death of organ builder Arp Schnitger - with nightly organ concerts and daily organ tours around Groningen province led leading Dutch organists including Sietze De Vries.

David will be a sophomore at Texas Christian University in the fall, studying organ with Dr. H. Joseph Butler, AAGO.

Held every three years, the Festival features prominent national and international conductors. This year, Eric Nelson, artistic director of the Atlanta Master Chorale, will conduct the 400-voice choir comprised of singers representing dozens of churches throughout North and East Texas. Cynthia Nott, artistic director and conductor of the Children's Chorus of Greater Dallas, will lead a children's choir prepared specifically for this festival. Bradley Hunter Welch, Organist for the Dallas Symphony Orchestra, will accompany the choir and the gathered assembly in singing the inspiring and timeless music of the Church.

Designed to highlight sacred music representing many eras and styles, the Festival will feature music from chant to gospel to classic hymns, as well as a new setting of Psalm 150 composed by Eric Nelson, all led by brass, organ, and choir.
